

DECEMBER 3, 2014

The Board Minutes of December 3, 2014, have not been formally approved and are subject to change or modification by the Public Body at its next meeting of January 7, 2015, or soon thereafter as it may be considered. All requirements of the "Open Public Meetings Act" have been complied with according to N.J.S.A. 10:4-6.

The notice of the meeting has been mailed to the Newark Star Ledger, Camden Courier Post, and the Trenton Times, and also notice has been posted on the Bulletin Board at the office of the Secretary of State, Trenton, New Jersey.

Board meeting of December 3, 2014, was called to order at 9:00 A.M.

David Freed, Acting Executive Director, was present from 9:00 A.M. until the close of the meeting.

Kathleen Moran, Administrative Assistant, III, was present from 9:00 A.M. until the close of the meeting.

Marian Fiore, Senior Management Assistant, was present from 9:00 A.M. until the close of the meeting.

Joseph Donofrio, Deputy Attorney General, was present from 9:00 A.M. until the close of the meeting.

The Board saluted the Flag.

Motion made by Mr. Gino Pasqualone and seconded by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo, and unanimously passed, to approve (24) Initial Licenses effective December 3, 2014 to March 31, 2015.

Motion made by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo and seconded by Mr. James H. Flaherty, and unanimously passed, to approve (13) Initial Business Permits effective December 3, 2014 to March 31, 2015.

Motion made by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo and seconded by Mr. Constantinos Papademas, and unanimously passed, to approve (1) Initial Business Permit Previously Expired effective December 3, 2014 to March 31, 2015.

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Motion made by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo and seconded by Mr. James H. Flaherty, and unanimously passed, to approve (4) Changes in Business Permits effective December 3, 2014 to March 31, 2015.

Motion made by Mr. Constantinos Papademas and seconded by Mr. Gino Pasqualone, and unanimously passed, to approve the Minutes of the 889th Open Session Business meeting held July 9, 2014.

The Board reviewed an application for Continuing Education Course/Seminar Approval received from Marilyn Becker, Samson Electrical Supply, requesting approval of two new courses.

Motion made by Mr. Constantinos Papademas and seconded by Mr. Gino Pasqualone, and unanimously passed, to approve two (2) new courses and an instructor.

The Board reviewed an application for Continuing Education Course/Seminar Approval received from Abdelfttah Elgendy, A & A Electrical Education Services, LP, requesting approval of previously approved courses under Sponsor #144 of which Mr. Elgendy was an approved instructor and a partner.

Motion made by Mr. Constantinos Papademas and seconded by Mr. Gino Pasqualone, and unanimously passed, to approve Mr. Elgendy's request to teach courses previously approved under the sponsorship of A & A NEC Education (ECSP 144). However, Mr. Elgendy will be advised that his request to teach the four hour course entitled "Changes to the NEC 2011" is being held in abeyance pending receipt of a course description.

The Board reviewed an application for Continuing Education Course/Seminar Approval received from Phiphop Phillip Sengchanh, Silent Knight by Honeywell, requesting approval of one new course.

Motion made by Mr. Constantinos Papademas and seconded by Mr. Gino Pasqualone, and unanimously passed, that Mr. Sengchanh's request to teach the course entitled "Installation of IntelliKnight addressable FACP's" is denied as this course does not meeting the criteria of continuing education pursuant to N.J.A.C. 13:31.1.7. It is the Board's opinion that this course is product specific and lacks general application for electrical contractors.

The Board reviewed an application for Continuing Education Course/Seminar Approval received from David C. Milazzo, Local Union #164 IBEW, requesting approval of two new courses.

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Motion made by Mr. Constantinos Papademas and seconded by Mr. Gino Pasqualone, and unanimously passed, that Mr. Milazzo's request to teach the course entitled "Foremanship Concepts" and "Medium Voltage Splicing Class" is being held in abeyance. The Board requests that Mr. Milazzo provide it with a more detailed breakdown and description/format of the courses to be taught. The Board also requests that Mr. Milazzo complete an Application for Continuing Education Course/Seminar Approval.

The Board reviewed an application for Continuing Education Course/Seminar Approval received from Tom Pernal, Tom Pernal Electrical Seminars, LLC, requesting approval of new courses.

Motion made by Mr. Constantinos Papademas and seconded by Mr. Gino Pasqualone, and unanimously passed, to approve three (3) new courses and instructors. The Board also approved Mr. Pernal's request to add instructors to teach all previously approved courses.

Letter dated September 16, 2012, received from Allen G. Rowles requesting reinstatement of his License #6933 which expired on March 31, 1997.

Mr. Rowles was present at today's meeting and advised the Board that he intends to retire from his current job as an Electrical Subcode Official. Mr. Rowles also stated he has been employed by Hopewell Township since 1993 and has been a member of the Burlington County Board of Appeals for 20 years. Mr. Rowles further stated he let his license lapse and did not realize he could table his license. It was not until three or four years ago that he found out he could have put his license in inactive status. Mr. Rowles stated he is taken continuing education courses.

Mr. Rowles stated he is unsure if he will need the license to go into business, but he may need it to do consulting work.

Mr. Rowles also stated he performed the electrical work on the addition to his home and has assisted other contractors over the years.

Mr. Schooley advised Mr. Rowles that the Board will consider his request.

Mr. Rowles thanked the Board for considering his request.

Motion made by Mr. Constantinos Papademas and seconded by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo, and unanimously passed, that the Board go into Executive Closed Session to consider his request.

After discussion in Closed Session, the Board returned to Public Session for the following motion:

Motion made by Mr. James H. Flaherty and seconded by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo, and unanimously passed, because Mr. Rowles has been

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actively involved in the electrical field as a Subcode Official, the Board determined that Mr. Rowles' License #6933 be reinstated with the proviso that Mr. Rowles first attend eight hours of business courses; ten hours of OSHA courses; an NFPA 70E course; and 34 of Continuing Education courses for the 2015 triennial renewal. Before taking these courses, Mr. Rowles must submit course information to the Board for approval. Upon completion of same, along with an application for reinstatement, proof of having attended the continuing education courses, and proper fees, the Board approves Mr. Rowles' request to reinstate License #6933.

Letter dated November 5, 2014, received from Waldo H. Carkhuff, Esq., on behalf of Joseph Regan, License #9191, t/a Surfside Electric, stating Mr. Regan will be able to make monthly payments in the amount of \$2,000.00 beginning December 1, 2014.

Civil Action Final Consent Order and Judgement filed October 27, 2004, by Judge Clyne ordering Mr. Regan to pay a civil penalty in the amount of \$30,000.00 and attorney's fees in the amount of \$1,110.78 for violation of N.J.S.A. 45:5A-9. Payments started March 29, 2005 and the balance due is \$21,713.78.

DAG Donofrio stated the Order did stipulate if Mr. Regan failed to pay the civil penalty assessed against him, his license and business permit would be suspended. However, the Board can accept the payment plan requested by Mr. Carkhuff.

Motion made by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo and seconded by Mr. Constantinos Papademas, and unanimously passed, that Deputy Attorney General Joseph Donofrio prepare a Consent Order ordering that Mr. Regan pay the remainder of the civil penalty assessed against him in monthly installments. Should Mr. Regan miss a single installment, his License and Business Permit #9191 will be suspended.

Response to the Uniform Penalty Letter received from Curtis Wood, Powerhouse Retail Services, to the Uniform Penalty Letter offering Powerhouse Retail Services the opportunity to settle the matter by paying a civil penalty in the amount of \$2,000.00 for violation of N.J.S.A. 45:5A-9.

Motion made by Mr. Constantinos Papademas and seconded by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo, and unanimously passed, that this matter be discussed in Executive Closed Session.

After discussion in Closed Session, the Board returned to Public Session for the following motion:

Motion made by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo and seconded by Mr. Constantinos Papademas, and unanimously passed, that the civil penalty assessed against Powerhouse Retail Services in the amount of \$2,000.00 for violation of N.J.S.A. 45:5A-9 be rescinded as there is no proof to substantiate Powerhouse Retail Services engaged in the business of electrical contracting.

Edward Johnson has failed to respond to the Administrative Action Provisional Order of Discipline filed September 3, 2014, ordering that his License and Business Permit #7469 be provisionally revoked; he cease and desist from engaging in the practice of electrical contracting until

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such time as the Board shall authorize his reinstatement; pay a civil penalty in the amount of \$20,000.00 for failing to return his pressure seal issued to Ed Johnson Electric and pay a civil penalty in the amount of \$5,000.00 for continuously advertising, entering into, engaging in and working as an electrical contractor without securing a business permit in violation of N.J.S.A. 45:5A-9 and N.J.A.C. 13:31-1.5(e); and pay a civil penalty in the amount of \$5,000.00 for engaging in professional and occupational misconduct in violation of N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(e). Mr. Johnson is provisionally prohibited from applying for reinstatement until such time as he fully satisfies all penalties and requirements of the Order. Mr. Johnson is provisionally reprimanded for violating and failing to comply with the provisions of an act and regulation administered by the Board in violation of N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(h) and provisionally reprimanded for engaging in professional and occupational misconduct pursuant to N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(e).

Motion made by Mr. James H. Flaherty and seconded by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo, and unanimously passed, that Deputy Attorney General Joseph Donofrio finalize the Provisional Order of Discipline and issue a Final Order of Discipline ordering Mr. Johnson's License and Business Permit #7469 be revoked; he cease and desist from engaging in the practice of electrical contracting until such time as the Board shall authorize his reinstatement; pay a civil penalty in the amount of \$20,000.00 for failing to return his pressure seal issued to Ed Johnson Electric and pay a civil penalty in the amount of \$5,000.00 for continuously advertising, entering into, engaging in and working as an electrical contractor without securing a business permit in violation of N.J.S.A. 45:5A-9 and N.J.A.C. 13:31-1.5(e); and pay a civil penalty in the amount of \$5,000.00 for engaging in professional and occupational misconduct in violation of N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(e). Mr. Johnson is prohibited from applying for reinstatement until such time as he fully satisfies all penalties and requirements of the Order. Mr. Johnson is reprimanded for violating and failing to comply with the provisions of an act and regulation administered by the Board in violation of N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(h) and reprimanded for engaging in professional and occupational misconduct pursuant to N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(e).

The Board reviewed applications for the written examination. Twelve (12) applications were approved.

Darren Reaman, Director of Government Affairs, Custom Electronic Design & Installation Association (CEDIA), stated CEDIA specializes in the design and installation of electronic systems for the home. These systems include home networking, home automation and communication systems, media rooms, single or multi-room entertainment systems, and integrated whole-house subsystems providing lighting and HVAC control.

Mr. Reaman also stated CEDIA objects to the Board proposed amendment to N.J.A.C. 13:31-3.8. Mr. Reaman further stated many home technology professionals install energy monitoring and management systems, including photovoltaic solar and other forms of alternative energy. Photovoltaic solar systems are a hybrid of low-voltage and high voltage systems, and the amendments should allow home technology professionals to work on the low voltage direct current side of a photovoltaic solar system while allowing a licensed electrical contractor to complete the photovoltaic installation on the alternating current side of the transformer.

Mr. Reaman also stated CEDIA objects to the Board proposed amendment to N.J.A.C. 13:31-4.1. Mr. Reaman further stated that the proposal would negatively impact small businesses. Providing telecom wiring is a part of the services provided by home technology professionals. The proposed rule limits the exemption to a business solely when it is engaged in telecommunications wiring. Limiting the exemption changes the classification of the work they have always done and done safely and would require that the home technology

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professional be licensed as an electrical contractor.

Mr. Reaman stated CEDIA does not support the proposed amendment to N.J.A.C. 13:31-4.3. Mr. Reaman also stated LED lighting is appropriately within the purpose of the exemptions codified in this section. New Jersey should not restrict the installation of low-voltage LED lighting systems as the exclusive work of high voltage electrical contractors. LED lighting wiring is low-voltage and non-lethal.

DAG Donofrio stated the Board codified what is already existing law. In order to perform alarm work, you must have an alarm license. In order to perform electrical work, you must be a licensed electrical contractor, and in order to perform HVACR work, you need an HVACR license. DAG Donofrio also stated the word “solely” limits the work for telecommunication contractors; it does not apply to home automation systems. Additionally, the Board is governed by the exemption which indicates any work over ten volts must be performed by a licensed electrical contractor.

Sal Anderton, Esq. stated, on behalf of CEDIA, that this company has been working under the telecommunications wiring exemption for years and the narrowing of the exemption will affect this company.

DAG Donofrio stated the exemption has always been for the installation of telecommunications wiring. Work outside the scope of telecommunications would exceed the exemption. DAG Donofrio further stated New Jersey does not have a low voltage license.

Mr. Abromowitz asked who is allowed to install speaker wiring.

DAG Donofrio stated any wiring with a potential of more than ten volts would need to be installed by a licensed electrical contractor.

Mr. Flaherty stated the Board understands that the industry is revolving day to day; however, the Board can only clarify the Statutes.

Rachel Glasgow, Regulatory Analyst, appeared before the Board to discuss the comments received on proposed changes to its Rules and Regulations published in the New Jersey Register on September 15, 2014. The Board Rules and Regulations are set to expire on February 19, 2015.

Mrs. Glasgow stated she has summarized the comments and drafted initial responses for the Board’s review. Mrs. Glasgow also stated the Board received seven comments.

The first commenter supports the Board’s proposed changes.

Mrs. Glasgow stated the Board will thank the commenter for its’ support.

Mrs. Glasgow also stated three commenters had concerns regarding the proposed language in N.J.A.C. 13:31-3.8 which they feel would needlessly increase the licensing requirement and negatively impact the State. The commenters noted the Department of Labor does not require licensed electrical contractors perform this work and the Board does not cite any incident data to support its’ concerns.

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Ms. Glasgow stated the Board's response will be because exposed photovoltaic panels and solar inverters are capable of generating, transmitting and using electrical energy in excess of ten volts, that work must be performed by a licensed electrical contractor. The response will also indicate that the Department of Labor does not regulate the electrical contracting industry.

Mrs. Glasgow stated one commenter recommended revising the proposed rule to allow home technology professionals to work on the low-voltage direct current (DC) side of the photovoltaic solar system while allowing a licensed electrical contractor to complete the photovoltaic installation on the alternating current (AC) side of the transformer.

Mrs. Glasgow stated the Board's response will be New Jersey does not have a "low-voltage" exemption to the electrical contracting business requirements. The wiring of the photovoltaic systems exceed ten (10) volts' therefore, the installing, maintaining, servicing, and handling of photovoltaic panels, solar inverters, and all other electrical components must be performed by a licensed electrical contractor.

Mrs. Glasgow stated that three commenters objected to limiting the applicability of the telecommunications wiring exemption to those that solely provide telecommunication wiring services as defined in N.J.A.C. 13:31-4.1. The commenter has concerns that limiting the exemption changes the classification of the work performed by home technology professionals which they have always done and done safely and would require them to be licensed as an electrical contractor. The commenter also stated that the wired infrastructure used in residential electronic systems is not in place to deliver electricity, but rather to deliver information and intelligence. The commenter further noted that New Jersey law does not make a proper distinction between low-voltage electronic systems work and high-voltage electrical contracting.

Mrs. Glasgow stated the response would be the proposed amendments to N.J.A.C. 13:31-4.1 clarify the applicability of the existing telecommunications wiring exemption and do not alter its applicability. Pursuant to N.J.A.C. 13:31-4.1 the telecommunications wiring exemption does not exempt a business entity from the license and business permit requirements for the work of an electrical contractor or when engaging in the alarm or locksmith business. The exemption applies to a business solely when it is engaged in telecommunications wiring. The Board further notes that N.J.S.A. 45:5A-18 provides for an exemption from the electrical contracting business permit requirements for any work with a potential of less than 10 volts; New Jersey does not have a "low-voltage" exemption to the business permit requirements. Therefore, work with a potential which exceeds ten volts must be performed by a licensed electrical contractor who holds an active business permit.

Mrs. Glasgow stated three commenters expressed concern with the Board's proposed amendments to N.J.A.C. 13:31-4.3 pertaining to LED drivers. The commenters believe that removing LED drivers from the statutory exemption is contrary to the legislative intent of N.J.S.A. 45:5A-18(c). The commenters stated LED lighting is safer, longer lasting, and easier to install, and utilizes a low-voltage power supply and is non-lethal. The commenters noted that LED's are one of the most energy-efficient lighting technologies and replaces the traditional 110 AC power distribution in homes with a new standard more appropriate to the low-voltage needs and digital capabilities of electronic devices. LED lighting is appropriately within the exemption under N.J.S.A. 45:5A-18 (c) and the Board should not restrict the installation of low-voltage LED lighting systems as the exclusive work of high-voltage electrical contractors.

Mrs. Glasgow stated the Board's response will be New Jersey does not have a "low voltage" exemption to the business permit requirements.

LED Lighting systems exceed ten volts and it does not qualify for the statutory exemption under N.J.S.A. 45:5A-18 (i). Because LED lighting systems involve wiring, the replacement of LED drivers is a potentially dangerous activity for persons not properly trained in electrical contracting.

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Therefore, to ensure the health, safety, and welfare of the general public, the Board is clarifying that the replacement of LED drivers is not included within the statutory exemption authorizing unlicensed individuals to test, service, or repair electrical equipment or apparatus and such work must be performed by a licenced electrical contractor.

Mrs. Glasgow stated one commenter suggested that the Board further amend N.J.A.C. 13:31-2.1 to require a four year U.S. Department of Labor Apprenticeship as one of the eligibility requirements to sit for the licensing examination.

The Board requested that Mrs. Glasgow draft a response to indicate that the Board finds its regulation in its current format is producing qualified candidates; therefore, no change is required.

Mrs. Glasgow stated a new law went into effect on July 1, 2014, requiring electronic subscription. Therefore, the comment period has been extended for thirty days. Mrs. Glasgow also stated there is a chance the Board may receive additional comments; therefore, the new comment period will close on January 4, 2015.

Motion made by Mr. James H. Flaherty and seconded by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo, and unanimously passed, to approve the adopted language as amended including the comments drafted with requested changes. Should there be no further comments, the motion will go forward.

The Board reviewed Assembly Bill No. 3561 which requires that each professional or occupational board provide on its Internet website a secure process to allow applicants to complete online any application documents including any fee payments, required to obtain an initial license, certificate of registration, or certification, or renewal of an existing license, certificate of registration, or certification, as the case may be, and to submit electronically all necessary documentation for review and approval of the Board.

David Freed stated that the HVACR applications are submitted on line; however, third party documents are not required to be uploaded and submitted electronically. Mr. Freed also stated that this has been a burdensome process and he has been requesting that mandatory on-line submissions be required.

It is the opinion of the Board that it take a neutral position on Assembly Bill No. 3561 as there is a concern that some applicants may not be able to upload the application.

Joseph P. Schooley, Chairman, signed on this date an Administrative Action Consent Order ordering that Arnold Chernin's License #192 be revoked; Mr. Chernin cease and desist from representing himself as a licensed electrical contractor and from engaging in the practice of electrical contracting in the State of New Jersey; assessed a civil penalty in the amount of \$2,000.00 for violation of N.J.A.C. 13:31-3.5 and N.J.A.C. 13:31-3.3(b) of which \$1,000.00 shall be stayed provided Mr. Chernin complies with all terms of the Order.

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Joseph P. Schooley, Chairman, signed on this date an Administrative Action Final Decision and Order On Default ordering Luis Lopez, Unlicensed, cease and desist from the unlicensed practice of electrical contracting and assessed a civil penalty in the amount of \$1,000.00 for violation of N.J.S.A. 45:5A-9.

Motion made by Mr. Joseph F. Cantalupo and seconded by Mr. Constantinos Papademas, and unanimously passed, to go into Executive Closed Session to consider and to review consumer complaints, investigative reports and other information received pursuant to the Board's investigative authority in order to determine whether violations of the law, including Board regulations have occurred. The results of the deliberations will be made known when and if the Board determines to initiate disciplinary action or other law enforcement action.

Meeting adjourned at 2:00 P.M.
